Our Cemetery seminar in October is coming up fast and the preparations are well underway. I have invited several people who are interested and further publicity will be started to encourage more people to come.

All our member societies are working hard to promote local and family history. Many events are coming up with Phillip Island celebrating their sesquicentenary, many interesting thing happening. Grantville Day run by the new U3A history group on October 6th, Bass Valley Show and Tell Night for Christmas and every body's Christmas breakup which has us visiting each other in November and December.

SEHA is now faced with thinking about our future directions.....what sort of group do we wish to be? The connections that we share are most important and the resources that we can provide are vital. We can share speakers who we have found interesting, we can share news items and discoveries on the net and we can share publicity through facebook and web sites that promote the work of each member society. There is continuing interest in family history and we can offer assistance to those who have caught the bug. There are many anniversaries that can be celebrated....is the school 100? Is the town, village, shire 150? What can we do to promote these occasions?







S.E.H.A. QUARTERLY REPORT JULY 2018

Our society continues to keep very busy. The school programs seem to fall in the first two terms, just as well as preparation for other activities seems to be the latter half of the year. One major project continues to be "full on" is the work that we are doing with Bass Coast Shire, Heritage Victoria, D.B.Design and Context. The extension to the Railway Station Museum is still a major focus.

Cataloguing of photos, documents, artifacts and newspapers as well as restoration and preservation of objects continues to be weekly tasks of members and volunteers.

Research for various organisations or family history enquiries is a growing aspect of our services. Some recent examples of this are:

- The Wonthaggi State School Swimming Pool. The pool liner was damaged by vandals and needs to be replaced so the pool can be used. Our society was asked to research the history of the pool and Sam Gatto wrote a substancial PLOD Essay last month. We hope to make a booklet from this research and photos. The school is raising money to have the pool fixed.
- The Railway Crane. Some years ago the crane was dismantled due to public safety concerns. It lay in pieces on site until its very recent restoration.
 W.&D.H.S. has been involved in preparing information and photos for an interpretive sign which is to be placed at the site.

 The Wonthaggi Union Community Arts Centre has been renovated. Our contribution to this has been the basis for the "History of the Union Theatre" display on the western wall. The theatre is a lively centre for performing arts for local schools, theatrical group and performers from Melbourne as well as the Fine Film group with regular films and festivals.

The Gippsland Association of Affiliated Historical Societies awarded the Gippsland Regional History Award to Sam Gatto for "Outstanding contribution to the preservation and celebration of the history of Gippsland. Sam received this award in Trafalgar on 19th May, 2018.

Several of our members attended the meetings at Bass Coast Shire to discuss a variety of ideas which could add to the development of changes/needs of the town.

A new project has developed through a grant from The Wonthaggi Foundation. We are involved in a Then and Now digital presentation of the Central Area of the S.C.M., focusing on about 6-8 specific sites. In the process of selecting various photos, we discovered that one of the early panoramic photos that is displayed in the Museum foyer and has been reprinted over the years in public/government documents, ia actually a reverse negative print. No wonder we had much discussion and confusion about "what was where".

We have already planned our two events for Seniors' Festival. Because this year is the 50th anniversary of the closure of the S.C.M., we have planned a guided bus tour of the whole S.C.M. mines; Wednesday 10th October, 10:30am starting from the Watt Street Bus Stop.

Our Annual Dinner is also being organized, our topic this year is Wonthaggi Training Hospital. Speakers will take us to a very different era from the University path to nursing.

Today, Sam Gatto is one of the presenters at the Phillip Island Literary Festival. Some of our members are performing with the Bass Coast Chorale and local identity, Tom Green, is performing in Phantom of the Opera in Frankston.
